




Rodney spent most of his days looking up. Imagining, for hours, what a life high among the treetops would be like and how it would feel to be so ... tall.

ONE THOUSAND TREES KYLE HUGHES-ODGERS



This gorgeous picture book by award-winning artist Kyle Hughes-Odgers takes readers on a journey of imagination and discovery, exploring the nature of art and the art of nature. The book opens with a stark grey city scene and the words, 'Deep in the heart of the city, Frankie dreams of a thousand trees'. It then shifts to a forest depicted in translucent watercolour as Frankie moves over, under, between and above the trees, before finally returning to the city and transforming it with both art and nature. The text is very simple, leaving the reader to fully inhabit the artwork and ponder their own relationship with their world.

SWIMMING ON THE LAWN YASMIN HAMID



Told through the eyes of Farida, as well as her inquisitive sister and brothers, this is a beautiful story about growing up in Sudan. Sudanese culture and customs are brought to life, from the ubiquitous tea service and hearty breakfasts to the commemoration of Muslim holidays and the rites of birth and death. But a happy childhood spent in the capital and the rural villages of 1960s Sudan ends startlingly with a sudden military coup that changes the makeup of Farida's family forever.

Swimming on the Lawn is a powerful reminder that many children around the world are affected by war and are helpless against it.





Here, life is almost too good to be true: Blake is running a great new club called the Surf Shack, playing nights there with his surf music band *The Twang.* But then a young woman's body is found at the nearby Ocean View Motel, a matchbook from the Surf Shack on her bedside table. When Blake's friend Crane is arrested for the young woman's murder and the local sergeant doesn't want to know, it becomes clear that it is up to Blake – a man who is familiar with the art of coldblooded killing – to protect his corner of paradise.



When three young women go missing, Snowy Lane (from *City of Light*) is hired as a private investigator, but neither he nor the cops can find the killer.

Fast-forward 16 years, when Snowy Lane travels up to Broome in search of the daughter of a mining magnate. There he meets Dan Clement (from *Before It Breaks*), who is investigating a spate of thefts that appear to be related to local drug dealing. Snowy spies some of the recovered property from these crimes and recognises a personal item that belonged to one of the girls who went missing in Claremont all those years ago. Then the body of a young woman is found in the desert and the hunt is on for her killer.

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Detective Daniel Clement is back in Broome, licking his wounds from a busted marriage and struggling to be impressed by his new team of small-town cops. When a body is discovered at a local fishing spot, it is clearly not the result of a crocodile attack. Somewhere in Broome is a hunter of a different kind.

AUTHOR WINNER WESTERN AUSTRALIAN PREMIER'S BOOK AWARD It's the early 1980s in Western Australia: the heady days of excess, dirty secrets and personal favours. Former detective Frank Swann is still in disgrace, working as a low-rent PI. But when he's offered a security job by the State Premier's fixer, it soon becomes clear that someone is bugging the Premier's phone – and it may cost Swann more than his job to find out why.

Old Scores is the third book in the trilogy that began with *Line of Sight* and *Zero at the Bone*. It brings together stories of bikies, prostitutes, luxury yachts, dirty secrets, personal favours and old grudges in the kind of gripping crime novel we've come to expect from Whish-Wilson. As the final book in the series (it can also be read as standalone) it does wrap up a number of threads developed in the other two books, and ultimately Frank Swann is redeemed.


